

Organ Fact Sheet

Tracker "Mechanical" Action Pipe Organ
South German "Style" Organ

- Pipes: Approximately 1000
- Manuals: 2
- Pedal Board: 2
- Largest Pipe: 16' Wood Pipe – Trombone
- Smallest Pipes: The size of a small pencil.
- Wooden pipes are made of pine, spruce and other woods.
- Metal pipes are made of nickel, tin, and/or lead.

The interior action, which consist of thousands of little working parts, the pipe work and key desk were made in Germany. The black and gold wood case and the pipe shades were made in America. There are 18 stops. Each stop produces a different sound (i.e. flute, trumpet, etc.) The organ was completed during the first week of Lent 2001.

It took five men approximately 55 hours to assemble the organ. The work began on the afternoon of Monday, January 1. The first sounds produced from the organ were heard on Thursday, January 4, 2001.
